

Public Disturbances - Civil Unrest, Riot, Mobs



The most likely kind of civil or political disturbance that the average person might encounter is a large-scale riot such as those occurring in the 1960's and 1970's at various cities and college campuses around the country. These were usually associated with racial troubles, draft protests and gasoline shortages.



There is also the "mob" type of riot associated with an unfavorable decision by government or violent disagreement between marchers on both sides of a 'touchy' subject.



Last but not least is a "mad rush" riot where people are soo anxious to get into a store for that sale, a key sporting event or to the front of a stage at a concert.



Awareness of what is going on around is the key to avoiding these types of crises. **This alone will get you out of the way BEFORE the situation turns dangerous.**
